

The COVID-19 Green Certificate

The Dolomiti Superski automated control system verifies the validity of your COVID-19 Green Certificate by decoding the QR-Code.

All citizens of the Member States of the European Union have the right to obtain a digital or printed Green Certificate with their own personalised QR-Code. Many more countries have concluded agreements with the European Commission to make their digital certificates compatible and interoperable with the European ones.

These countries are currently enabled:

Albania, Andorra, Armenia, Cape Verde, El Salvador, Faroe Islands, Georgia, Iceland, Israel, Lebanon, Liechtenstein, Morocco, Moldova, Monaco, Montenegro, New Zealand, North Macedonia, Norway, Panama, San Marino, Serbia, Singapore, Switzerland, Taiwan, Thailand, Togo, Tunisia, Turkey, Ukraine, Uruguay, Vatican City, United Arab Emirates, United Kingdom. The list of these countries is constantly updated.

Before your departure, make sure you have a valid QR-Code to facilitate the issuing and activation of your ski pass.

For all other countries (non-EU and with non-compatible digital system):

According to current Italian legislation, **certificates of vaccination** issued by non-EU countries are also considered equivalent to COVID-19 Green Certificates, provided that the following requirements are met:

1. The vaccine administered is one of those recognised by the EMA, which are currently the following: Comirnaty (PfizerBioNtech), Spikevax (Moderna), Vaxzevria (AstraZeneca), COVID-19 Vaccine Janssen (Janssen-Johnson & Johnson), Covishield (Serum Institute of India), R-CoVI (R-Pharm), Covid-19 vaccine-recombinant (Fiocruz), Nuvaxovid (Novavax).
2. The certificate is drawn up in one of the following languages: English, French, German, Italian, Spanish or is provided with a sworn translation;
3. The certificate contains the identification data of the issuing authority;
4. the certificate contains the identification data of the holder (name, surname, date of birth);
5. In case of **completed vaccination cycle**:
 - a. currently: less than 9 months have elapsed since the completion of the vaccination cycle or the administration of the booster dose;
 - b. from 1 February 2022: less than 6 months have elapsed since the completion of the vaccination cycle or administration of the booster dose;

6. In the case of **administration of only the first dose** of a vaccine requiring 2 doses:
 - a. at least 15 days have elapsed since its administration; and
 - b. the expected date of completion of the vaccination cycle, which must be indicated on the certificate, has not yet elapsed;
 - c. if the date for the second administration is not indicated: the maximum validity of the certificate is **42 days for mRNA vaccines** (Pfizer Biontech and Moderna) and **84 days for other vaccines**.
 - d. clarification for minors under 16 years of age from the United Kingdom only: validity of 84 days, even if mRNA vaccines are used.

Italian law only recognizes certificates of vaccination, not certificates of recovery and diagnostic tests issued or carried out abroad.

Canada, Israel, Japan, United Kingdom (excluding territories outside the European continent) and USA

Certificates of recovery issued by these countries are also recognized. The requirements are the same as for certificates of vaccination. In addition, the date of recovery must be stated on the certificate, and the certificate is valid for 6 months after recovery.
